Our Colorado Trip

During the 2014 winter break, a group of Kama Scouts, Venturers and Leaders travelled to Colorado, USA. The invitation was from of a Troop of Boy Scouts from American we had met with the Australian Contingent at the Norwegian Jamboree in 2013. Our well-wishers included the Chief Commissioner and Regional Commissioner (Ginninderra) – a much appreciated show of support, considering that the bus that took us to Sydney and left promptly at 5:30am on a dark, cold mid-winter morning! We arrived at Sydney airport in time for our flight, feeling very excited and flaunting our awesome bright blue and yellow t-shirts. After a brief stopover in Los Angeles, and 31 hours of travelling later we arrived in Denver, Colorado to meet the families who had kindly agreed to host us in their homes. This was a great experience as our families showed us the best of their city, and gave us time to re-adjust our body clocks (and temperature gauges as it is summer over there)! We also experienced some of the best of American people, cuisine (Chicago hotdogs and large servings of pizza) and culture as it just so happened to be the fourth of July. After a barbeque at one of the host homes, we all later met up at the Denver baseball stadium for some intense baseball action (which none of the Aussies really understood) and later a crazy fireworks display.



Early the next morning we embarked on the first part of our adventure – a bus tour of the best tourist sites in Colorado! The bus trip was really good as we all got to know each other and we all bonded as if we had always known each other. The Americans seemed really fascinated by our accents and we laughed at the weird customs of both our nations. We established Patrols in which we would stay in for the rest of the trip and sang...a lot. Our first stop was the beautiful Garden of the Gods and later that day we also travelled to Bishop's Castle, which is basically a mismatched, majestic castle-like structure built by one very politically truculent man

nearly 50 years ago. We even met Mr Bishop himself and had a group photo!

We camped at the Great Sand Dunes National Park and the next day we hiked the treacherous, hot sand dunes. They look relatively small from a distance but in reality it is a very different experience which I think we all took something away from (I am still finding sand everywhere!). Then we were on the road again after witnessing a flag retirement ceremony performed by the Americans and sleeping out under the stars. After much more singing and the occasional nap we arrived at Mesa Verde, where we had a brief stop at some incredible mountain ranges. We set up camp (that had bear bins everywhere to put your rubbish in so as to prevent bears from wreaking havoc) and played lots of games. The next day we experienced the ancient wonders of the Mesa Verde canyon cliff dwellings that were inhabited for thousands of years and are only accessible from up or down.

We hit the road again the next morning and travelled through spectacular mountain passes before arriving at Fruita, a seemingly beautiful town until it reaches nightfall and the mozzies arrive! The temperature also reached 90 degrees (F) that afternoon and we took advantage of the shower blocks. We visited a dinosaur museum and some people went mountain bike riding through a beautiful canyon. Then the group packed up and set out on the high adventure part of the journey – the three-day canoe trip. We slept overnight at the starting point where we would put the canoes in and after another night under the stars (and right next to the railroad line along which several trains passed during the night) we set off down the river. We arrived at our campsite that afternoon which was located in the middle of a gorgeous canyon and we all set up camp. We toured the canyon the next day with our guides and floated down the rapids with life-vests, also taking advantage of a nearby waterfall to get relatively clean again. The last part of the canoe trip was just as good as the first, and that afternoon we said goodbye to the river (for the time being) and headed back to Fruita for the night. Our next stop was Glenwood springs where we were going white water rafting, an awesome experience, going down insane rapids called 'man breaker' and 'frog in a blender', all of which deserved their names. Then that afternoon we relaxed in the Glenwood hot springs until it closed before eating the largest pizzas we had ever seen, true American style. That night we slept indoors for the first time in the whole trip!



The next day we did a small 'preparation hike' for the "14er" which was Hanging Lake Hike, a picturesque but rather steep climb with a beautiful lake at the top. After a short stop in Vale (a rich ski resort town) we headed to the camp at the base of the 14er, our last night camping. We had a hilarious skit night and an emotional campfire while we all spent our last night together, waking up at 3:30 am the next morning to climb the 14er. (This is the general name given to peaks over 14,000 feet). Mt Quandry's starting altitude was already higher than Mt Kosciusko and the climb was steep

and slow going over loose rocks, with snow surrounding us. The peak was magnificent and worth the climb and we all reached the bottom feeling as if we had achieved our best. Then we returned to our host families for a good night's rest and wash.

Our final day in America was spent at one of the largest water parks in the northern hemisphere – Water World, and then an unforgettable dinner at Casa Bonita, a Mexican restaurant with 'daring cliff divers, exciting gunfights, musicians, magicians and an atmosphere unlike any other' (quote from the menu). We said goodbye to our homestay families and the next day we were on our way back home to Australia.

The trip was really an incredible experience and one that we shall all remember for the rest of our lives! We plan to see them all again soon and stay in touch, while organising for them to hopefully come to Australia in 2016!


World Scout Scarf Day 2014 - Proud to Scout!
